COVID IN BERGAMO



If all of you remember earlier this year, Italy was the hardest hit country in Europe by the pandemic and Bergamo, Pueblo's Sister City, was, apparently the hardest hit city in Italy. The Pueblo Sister City Commission and Pueblo Rotary 43 launched a campaign to raise funds to assist Bergamo and our Dante Alighieri Society was the largest donor. Our friends in Bergamo were most grateful.

Recently I contacted a number of our friends in Bergamo to see how the situation is now. It is better but, like us, they are not "out of the woods". That said, Italian specialist travel agent Guido Adelfio recently visited Italy (he has dual citizenship) and told me, "There is less Covid in Italy than in the White House!"

It's not quite that good! Our economic development and Rotary contact Giuseppe Venuti (we have a Sister Rotary connection with Bergamo as well) says "The situation in Italy is not dramatic but not good as well. Now we know more about the virus and the death rate is very, very low." He does lament the damage done to the economy. "The real problem is for tourism which is completely destroyed after one year of being stopped. The situation is dangerous for our economy even here in Lombardy where we generally don't have economic problems."

Elvira Messina, former assistant to the president and the person with whom we coordinated the Sister City agreement feels there is over reaction. She recently toured many parts of Europe and reports "In Italy there is mass hysteria I didn't see anywhere else in Europe." She also reports that "they know this virus better and can treat it before the patients get to the last stage."



Former exchange student Stefano Longaretti reports, "We're doing quite well. The number of infected people is increasing but we are managing them quite well so far. On the other hand, I am quite sure the situation will get worse in the next few weeks so we'll probably be forced to heavier restrictions." CSU Pueblo and the University of Bergamo are Sister Universities.

So while it appears the worst is over for Bergamo, they now appear to be in about the same situation as we in Pueblo!

So as Giuseppe says "we too are forced to always wear masks and it is not comfortable at all to go around with glasses always bleared, but's that's it!"


Yes, Giuseppe, sadly, that's it!

As you may know, 2021 marks the 700th anniversary of Dante Alighieri's passing. The year is especially important to Italophiles, Dante members, and admirers of the "supreme poet." Furthermore, the year will mark a celebration of Italy and the figure of Dante throughout the world.

In person and virtual events, performances, exhibitions and conferences are being planned for the entire 2021 year. The General Secretary of the Dante Alighieri Society of Rome, Aleesandro Masi, recently said, "Commemorare Dante significa rendere omaggio al padre della nostra lingua e ad un caposaldo della letteratura europea e mondiale. Students will read the 14,000+ line poem with its astounding hendecasyllabic rhyme scheme, known as the terza rima and invented by Dante. Stay tuned for announcements on virtual and in-person events that coincide with the homage of seven centuries of Dante, including highlights of his contribution to the world's cultural patrimony.
